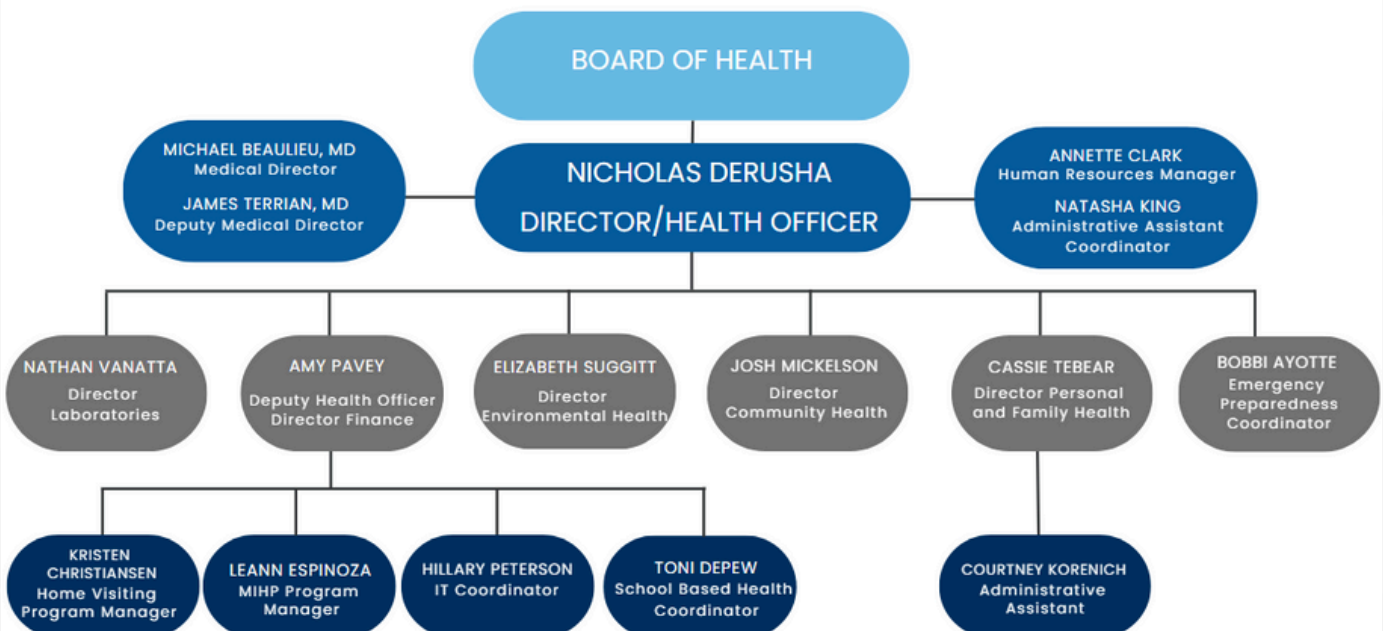

COMMUNITY HEALTH

Luce County Communities That Care (CTC)

Throughout the year, the CTC and community partners hosted outreach, prevention, and wellness events to engage residents of all ages and strengthen community connections.

- **Luce County Resource Fair:** Reached 207 attendees and 25 agencies, offering vaccinations, winter gear, diaper giveaways, medication take back, hygiene kits, health screenings, and raffles.
- **Senior Readiness Workshops:** Four workshops supported post-graduation planning for high school seniors, including FAFSA completion, college applications, scholarships, resumes, and interview preparation, with attendance ranging from 1–29 participants.
- **Dodgeball Tournament:** A substance-free event promoting positive youth–professional relationships, with 90 attendees and \$400 raised in donations.
- **Tackle Party:** Attracted more than 400 community members, including over 300 children ages 0–14. Every child received fishing gear, youth meals were free, and community partners included local law enforcement, DNR, and MSU Extension.
- **Ink for a Cause – Mental Health Tattoo Event:** Approximately 50 attendees, with 30 participants receiving mental health-themed tattoos. The event promoted awareness and stigma reduction, with \$600 donated to the CTC by Wyld Flower Studio.
- **Suicide Ribbon Campaign:** Engaged more than 10 local businesses and raised \$318 to support a Mental Health Day for students in the Health CTE program at Tahquamenon Area Schools.



In February 2025, the Luce County Communities That Care (CTC) coalition was honored in Washington, D.C., for completing the first-ever National CADCA Opioid Coalition Academy, recognized alongside 13 other Michigan coalitions.

Narcan Training

- 88 individuals trained to administer Narcan.
- The following groups were trained: LMAS Staff, Pictured Rocks Cruise Staff, Mackinac Straits Emergency Department, Schoolcraft Memorial Hospital Emergency Department, Kiwanis of Alger County, Caregiver Incentive Project, and JKL Bahweting School Nurses.
- In total, 1,575 doses of Narcan were distributed.



LMAS installed a free Narcan distribution box at Schoolcraft Memorial Hospital Behavioral Health Clinic and Altran Transit Service. This brings the total number of distribution boxes to five in our region.

COMMUNITY HEALTH

Tobacco Health Services

In 2025, LMAS expanded its Community Health team by launching Tobacco Health Services for teens, adults, and community members across the district. To introduce the program, LMAS partnered with Bennett Media Group on a student-featured tobacco awareness social media campaign representing schools in all four counties. The campaign ran from August 1 through December 31, 2025, across four major platforms, promoting tobacco-free lifestyles throughout the service area.

Additional Tobacco Health Services include:

- **INDEPTH:** A school-based, alternative-to-suspension tobacco program launched in September 2025 in Newberry, Munising, and Manistique.
- **Hidden in Plain Sight:** A community exhibit educating adults on youth tobacco use, targeted marketing, and concealment methods.
- **Tobacco-Free Parks:** Eighty outdoor tobacco-free signs purchased for distribution across district parks and recreation sites, including 20 signs installed at nine locations in the City of Manistique.

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Harm Reduction and Peer Recovery

Clients are referred from drug/mental health courts, jails, local providers, medication assisted treatment or self-referrals. As part of our harm reduction and peer recovery services, clients are offered other resources including inpatient treatment, food resources, housing, transportation, connections to primary care and relapse prevention planning.



Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT)

In partnership with Helen Newberry Joy Hospital, LMAS continues to provide medication assisted treatment services in Schoolcraft and Alger counties. LMAS meets with clients interested in medication to assist with their substance use disorder. During these visits, clients also meet with a community health worker to assess additional needs and connect them with supportive services. Throughout the year, LMAS averaged serving more than nine MAT clients per month.

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HOME VISITATION

MATERNAL INFANT HEALTH PROGRAM (MIHP)

A Registered Nurse or Master Social Worker provides home visits to pregnant women and families with infants up to one year of age who have Medicaid as their primary insurance. Services include prenatal care support; education and guidance for pregnancy, labor, delivery, and breastfeeding; healthy lifestyle support such as nutrition and smoking cessation; and referrals for substance use treatment, domestic violence services, counseling, and housing resources. The program promotes healthy pregnancies, positive birth outcomes, and healthy mothers and infants.

HEALTHY FAMILIES U.P.

Healthy Families is a free, voluntary home visiting program providing personalized, strength based, family-focused support strengthening knowledge and skills on child development, parenting practices, and child safety.

During fiscal year 2025, the LMAS Program Manager became a Peer Reviewer. Peer Reviewers are the backbone of the Healthy Families America Quality Assurance and Accreditation system. They must be knowledgeable about Healthy Families America and its best practice standards, and able to openly, honestly, and fairly assess a site's current ability to implement those standards. Peer Reviewers represent a variety of professional backgrounds.

SCHOOL BASED HEALTH

LMA operates two school-based child and adolescent health centers: The CAMP at Tahquamenon Area Schools in Newberry and the Saints Health Center at St. Ignace Area Schools in St. Ignace. Both centers serve students ages 5–21 and provide medical and mental health services delivered by a Nurse Practitioner or Physician Assistant and an Adolescent Therapist. Providers also visit classrooms to offer education on chronic disease management, health promotion and risk reduction, mental and social-emotional health, and reproductive health.

PERSONAL AND FAMILY HEALTH

Women Infants and Children (WIC)

WIC offers a wide range of services that extend beyond nutrition assistance, supporting the health and well-being of individuals, families, and the broader community. In FY 2025, WIC redeemed \$468,511.97 in benefits throughout the LMAS Health District, contributing to the local economy.

WIC services include:

- Nutrition assistance for eligible individuals and families
- Developmental and psychosocial assessments conducted by WIC nurses
- Referrals to home visiting programs as needed
- Growth monitoring and tracking
- Referrals to a registered dietitian
- Breastfeeding support services, including:
 - Peer counseling
 - Lactation consultant support
 - Breastfeeding supplies, such as breast pumps
- Assessment of lead screening status
- Immunizations
- Iron levels
- Coordination with medical providers to address identified client needs

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Immunizations

LMAS provides immunizations for pediatric, adolescent, and adult clients, with a focus on timely, opportunistic vaccination to keep individuals up to date. Efforts continue to restore pediatric and adolescent coverage rates to pre-pandemic levels. Combination vaccines are used to maximize protection while reducing the number of injections, and satellite clinics are offered to minimize travel barriers for clients.

The LMAS Wear One Campaign, launched on Mackinac Island in June 2024, continued in 2025 to increase free condom availability, raise awareness, and promote condom use. The campaign aims to reduce STIs and unplanned pregnancies by eliminating barriers such as cost and access.

PERSONAL AND FAMILY HEALTH

Hearing and Vision

LMAS has one hearing and vision technician who travels across all four counties to screen children from preschool through 12th grade. The Bling vision scanner that was purchased in fiscal year 2024 continued to aid in the diagnosis of strabismus and amblyopia in children who are nonverbal or unable to follow typical screening procedures.

Children's Special Health Care Services

- LMAS caseload was 155 clients, with 20 clients age 21 and older
- Plan of Cares increased by 24%
- Care coordination increased by 35%
- Staff continue to meet unique client needs, including referrals, equipment, prescription medications, and travel/lodging reimbursement.

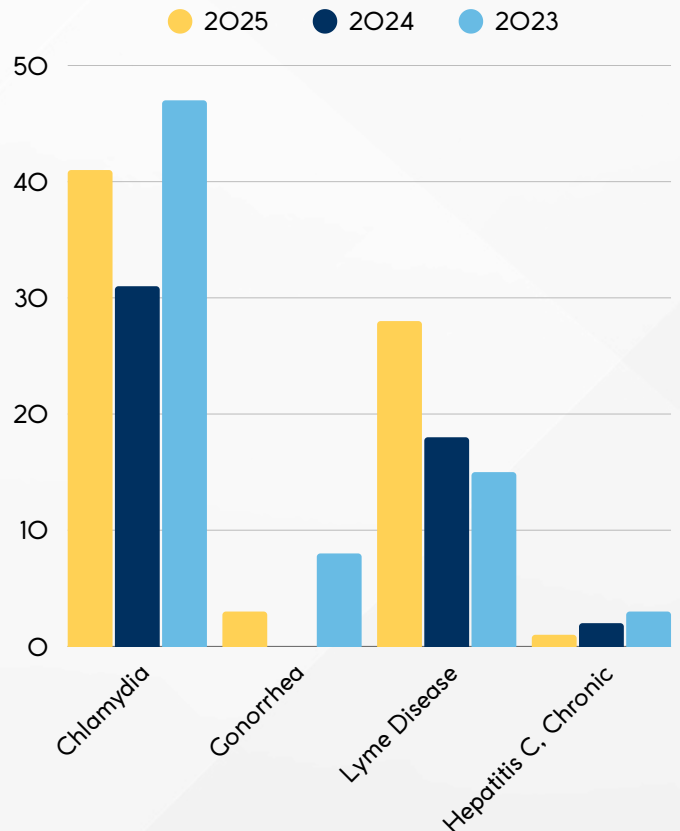
Kindergarten Oral Health Assessment

All children entering kindergarten receive an oral health assessment to help identify dental concerns early. LMAS's registered dental hygienist follows up with the parents of students suspected of having tooth decay, assisting families with locating a dentist, and scheduling appointments as needed. In addition, oral health screenings are also offered during WIC appointments in Luce County.

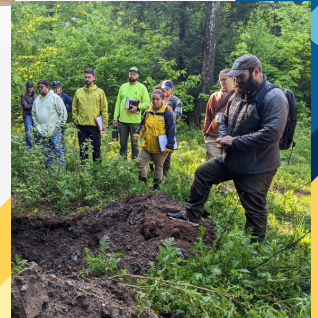


ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH

The Environmental Health (EH) Division works to protect the public from waterborne, foodborne, and vector-borne diseases through permitting, inspecting, and education. The division manages various programs, including food service sanitation, water supply, sewage disposal, campgrounds, soil erosion, swimming pools, rabies, complaint investigation, radon, and beach monitoring.

Key Accomplishments:

- Conducted E. coli monitoring at 6 Great Lakes beaches and 2 inland lakes beaches.
- Received a grant through the National Environmental Health Association to work towards conformance with the FDA National Retail Food Program Standards in our Food Service Program.
- Hosted a Plan Review training by the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development in Luce County for food safety program inspectors.
- Participated in a Private/Type 3 Well Program review with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE), ensuring that community water supplies meet safety standards.
- Participated in a Non-Community Public Water Supply Program review with the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE), supporting the protection of public water sources in non-residential settings.
- Successfully planned and hosted a training session in the Luce County Office conference room for licensed septic system installers to maintain their continuing education credits.
- Assisted the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) with an identified Harmful Algal Bloom in South Manistique Lake in Mackinac County.

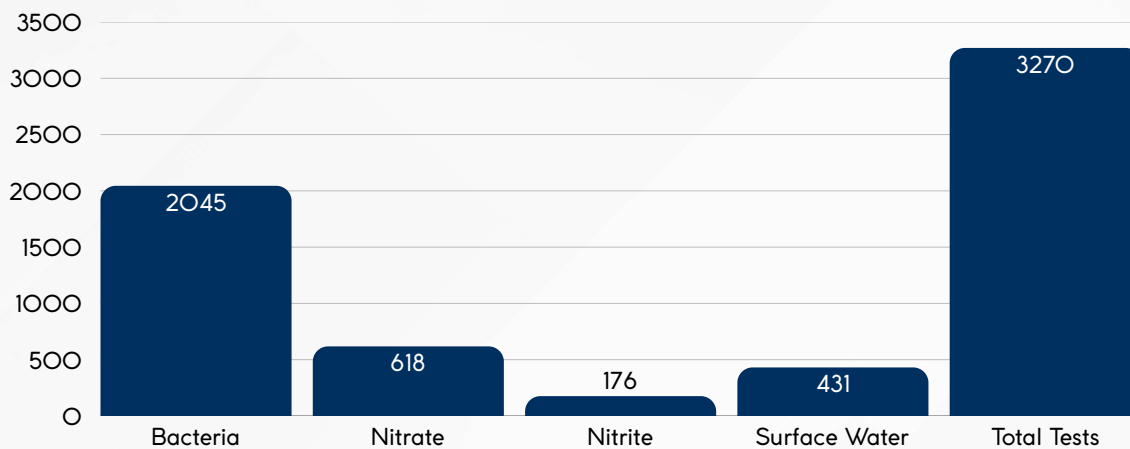
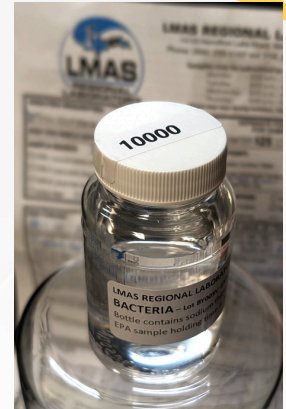

- The Water Laboratory processed its 10,000th test in October 2024.
- FY 2025 marked the busiest year to date, with over 100 more tests conducted than in FY 2024.
- A new partial chemistry analyzer was installed and validation testing was completed.

Tabletop Exercises

The Cut River Response exercise was an oil release into the Cut River and Lake Michigan. Objectives focused on interagency response processes, identifying the most vulnerable areas, and determining staging areas, launch sites, and initial actions to support an effective spill response.

The Severe Weather exercise held at Northern Michigan University focused on the activation of the Michigan Transportable Emergency Surge Assistance medical unit and the Michigan Mortuary Response Team Disaster Portable Morgue Unit to deploy outdoor in cold weather conditions.

Mackinac Straits Health System held an exercise in collaboration with LMAS to review the process for a measles positive or exposed patient on Mackinac Island.

The Michigan Medical Response and Surge Exercise evaluated the region's capacity to manage a large-scale, community-wide patient surge. Public health objectives included disseminating surge-related messaging and guidance on seeking medical care, posting situational updates in MICIMS, and requesting volunteers through the Michigan Volunteer Registry to support response operations.

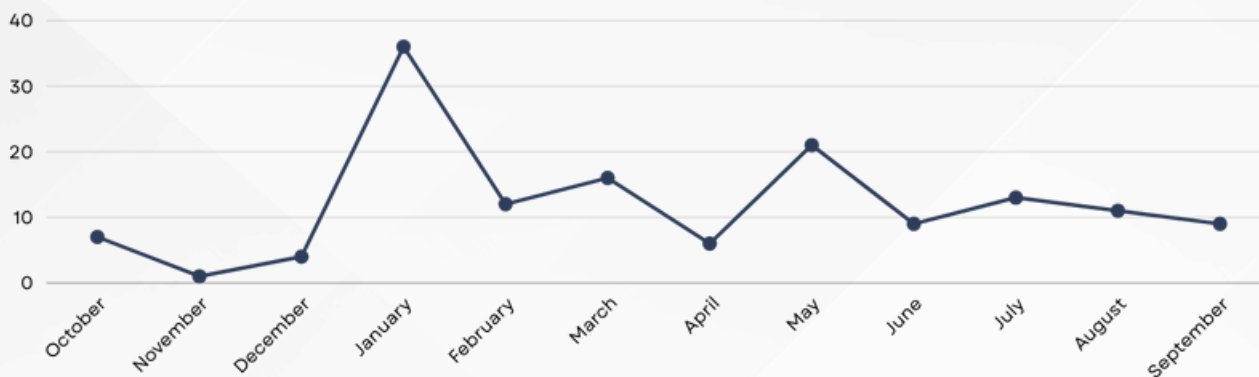

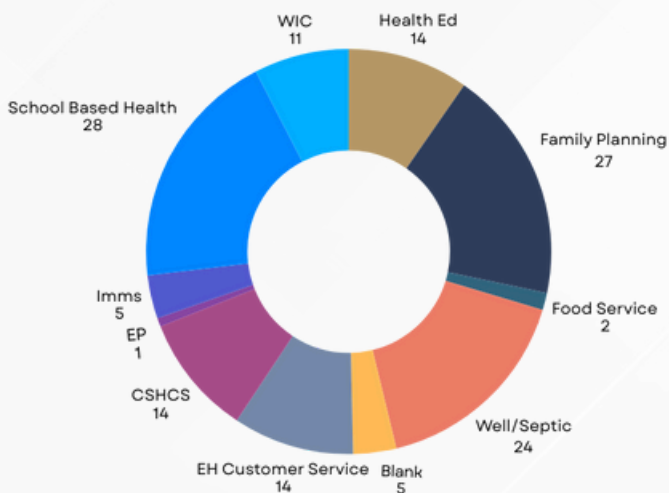

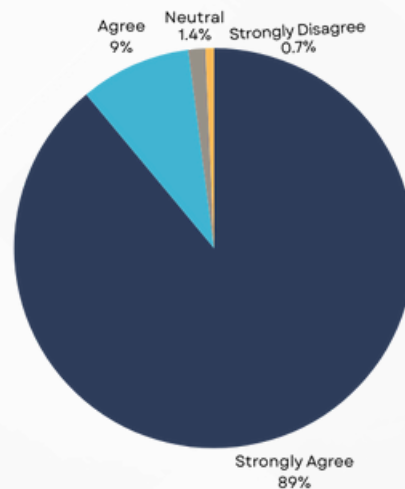
Surveys Received Over Time



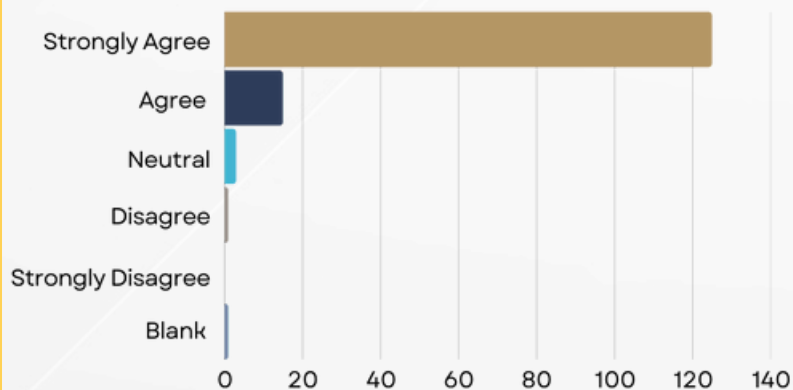
Surveys Received by Program
